+++ From the Pastor +++ The Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 21, 2014

Christmas Day is the great day of our salvation. *Our salvation*. That is the whole reason that God the Son, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, became Man. The Word became Flesh and dwelt among us so that He might suffer, die and rise to new life to save us from our sins. Jesus Christ does save us from our sins, but only if we desire this salvation. 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In these final days before Christmas we may look to the Blessed Virgin Mary and Saint Joseph to be our companions as once again we anticipate the joy of the birth of our Savior and King, Christ the Lord.

Our Blessed Mother and Saint Joseph were Chosen by God from all of the women and men of the world to be the mother and foster-father of His Only-Begotten Son. Now they constantly intercede for us, asking their Son to show us His mercy and love. Perhaps we might take some time this week, before Christmas, to ask Mary and Joseph to help us prepare a quiet place in our hearts for the Son of God to be born anew in us.

May this final week of Advent find us waiting and watching with the joy and wonder that filled the hearts and minds and souls of our Blessed Mother and Saint Joseph as we look forward to the power of God's grace breaking into our world on Christmas.
