Religious Education

HAPPY THANKSGIVING:

No 1st Communion class on the 19th class will resume on November 26th. All other classes will be held on November 19th and will be canceled on the 26th for the Thanksgiving Holiday.

On the 4th Thursday of November we celebrate Thanksgiving Day, a time to give thanks for all the blessings we have received during the year.

However, Thanksgiving has lost much



However, Thanksgiving has lost much of its original religious significance

and seems to be focused more on cooking, eating and being with family and friends, watching football and Macy's Thanksgiving parade.

In 1620 a small ship, the Mayflower landed in the "New World". The first winter was a brutal winter and they remained on the ship for the winter and many died from exposure, scurvy and disease. In the Spring the colonists moved ashore where they received a surprise visit from a member of the Abenaki tribe who spoke English. Later he returned with a Native American, Squanto (a member of the Pawtuxet tribe) who taught them how to cultivate corn, fish and collect sap from Maple trees. In November 1621 after a successful corn harvest the Governor (William Bradford) organized a day of feast and invited a group of Native American allies. (The first Thanksgiving) In 1623 the Governor called for a religious fast and thanksgiving to mark the end of a long drought. In 1789 President Washington issued the first Thanksgiving proclamation.

In 1817 New York became the first state to adopt Thanksgiving as an annual holiday. Sarah Josepha Hale (she wrote "Mary had a Little Lamb") led a campaign to establish Thanksgiving as a national holiday. In 1863 President Lincoln, at the height of the Civil War issued a proclamation asking all Americans to pray to heal the wounds of the nation. He designated the last Thursday of November as a day of Thanksgiving and in 1939 President Franklin moved it up a week in an attempt to improve retail sales during the "Great Depression". In 1941 the president signed a bill making Thanksgiving the 4th Thursday of November.
